Mai'ukkuh pia kwi'nna nemekante yetsekinna.

Now the eagle is flying toward me.

Mai'ukkuh pia kwi'nna nemenai yetsehku.

Now the eagle is flying away from me.

Pui! Oten tokoa nuyuakwainna.

Look! That snake is slithering around.

Enee! Mai'ukkuh tokoa nemekante nuyuakinna.

Oh no! Now the snake is slithering toward me.

Tsaan! Mai'ukkuh tokoa nemenai nuyuahku.

Good! Now the snake is slithering away from me.

Aisen sonaikkku sokopittan nanewenee nuate.

And that's how animals move.

nuyuah	slither / crawl	-nai	away from (noun suffix)

pia kwi'nna	eagle	-kante	toward (noun suffix)
